

The August 2014 Torrential Rain Disaster:

in the early dawn hours of August 20, 2014, a torrential rain disaster claimed the lives of 77 (includes deaths related to the disaster) in areas such as Asaminami Ward of Hiroshima City.

In addition, 179 homes were completely destroyed and 1,079 roads, bridges, and river embankments were damaged.





Directions

● By car

approx. 12 minutes from Hiroshima Interchange on the Sanyō Expressway. Parking available. Buses will need to make reservations in advance.

● By public transportation

JR: approx. 7 minute walk from Bairin Station on the Kabe Line (about 550 meters)
Bus: approx. 7 minute walk from the Yagi Bairin Bus Stop (about 550 meters)

● By taxi

approx. 12 minutes from Midorii Station on the Kabe Line.

Supporting recovery and reconstruction efforts that only disaster victims can provide.






Park (Emergency evacuation site)
